Thesis Statements

A well-developed thesis statement is essential in producing a strong paper. Depending on your assignment, an effective thesis statement may be very explicit (e.g. argumentative, scientific essays) or implied (e.g. personal narrative, descriptive essays). In either case, your thesis should be clear to your audience.

When developing your thesis statement, it may be helpful to first think of it in these general terms: a thesis statement is what you believe to be true about your topic. It should also provide your audience with why you believe it to be true and/or how you will prove it is true in your paper. A good way to begin is to ask yourself questions about your topic. Ask yourself what you believe is true about your topic and how or why you believe it's true. The answers to these questions provide the starting point in forming your thesis statement. Once you've done that, you can follow the suggestions below to develop an effective draft of your thesis statement.

It's also important to remember that your original thesis statement can and should be revised **after** you've finished the draft. Sometimes as you research and write a paper, your ideas may change. After finishing your draft, take some time away from the paper. Then re-read all the way through the draft (without making any revisions), keeping those original questions in mind. After reading, ask yourself if you still believe your point is indeed true. If your ideas have changed, make sure you **revise your thesis statement** (also, asking yourself if you indeed proved your point in the manner your original thesis suggested can also help guide you in the revision process).

According to Heffernan and Lincoln in their handbook *Writing*, a **thesis statement**

- is the main point you express, explain, or try to prove in your paper
- makes a specific, precise assertion about your topic
- should be specific, pointed, and provocative, promising the reader(s) some new information about your topic
- should always be more than a vague generalization.

This means that your **thesis statement should make a kind of road map for your readers to follow** as they go through your paper. It should focus on the exact message you want them to take from your paper, and lay out an outline for how your paper will develop.

Since a thesis must be specific, this wouldn't be a very good thesis statement:

"The Writing Center is a neat place to go."
